This language-intensive three-week program is a full cultural immersion experience in Italy. The ITAS 202W course consists of a fast-paced grammar review through the reading of literary texts and newspaper articles, oral discussions on Italian current events, and compositions on cultural topics. The course includes a rich program of guest speakers, such as university professors and artists. Various cocurricular activities include: movie screenings, theater performances, and cultural activities with Italian students. ITAS 250W allows students to do an independent study.
